2007 International Education Week


The Office of International Programs will celebrate International Education Week this year by sponsoring several events on campus. This year marks the eighth annual International Education Week (IEW).


November 15 - "Exploring International Careers" - Workshop for Students 4:00 pm - 5:00 pm, Cone 208
