UNC System President Molly Broad Declares International Education Week

November 14-18, 2005

The United States Department of State and Department of Education have declared November 14-18, 2005, International Education Week. International Education Week provides an opportunity to promote programs that prepare Americans for a global environment and to celebrate the benefits of international education and exchange worldwide. During this period American colleges and universities are encouraged to recognize and promote the importance of international education through local events and activities on campuses and in their communities.

Erskine and Crandall Bowles Receive World Citizen Award

Erskine and Crandall Bowles were honored for their significant international accomplishments at the annual World Citizen Award Dinner hosted by the World Affairs Council of Charlotte (WACC) on October 25, 2005 at the Westin Charlotte.

The World Citizen Award recognizes prominent individuals with ties to the Carolinas, who have made accomplishments of international significance.

Erskine Bowles is a native of North Carolina and has held notable career positions in business and public service, including several appointments in former President Clinton's Administration. Most recently, Bowles was unanimously recommended to serve as the President of the University of North Carolina.

Crandall Bowles has served as the CEO of Springs Industries since 1997 and has been chairman of the board of directors since 1998. Springs Industries has facilities in 13 states and Canada and Mexico. Mrs. Bowles also serves on the boards of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, the African Wildlife Foundation, Charlotte Research Initiative, and the Maya Angelou Research Center on Minority Health.

The World Citizen Award has been presented annually since 1990 by WACC to recognize prominent individuals with ties to the Carolinas who have distinguished their careers with accomplishments of international significance. The keynote address was given by United Nations Chief of Staff Mark Malloch Brown. ■

UNC System Sends Delegation to China: Bradley Sekulich and Alan Shao Represent UNC Charlotte

In recognition of China's growing role in the world economy and to prepare students to better understand this dynamic culture, the UNC System recently sent a delegation of faculty and administrators to Shanghai and Beijing to explore future collaborative possibilities. Bradley Sekulich, interim director of Education Abroad and Alan



Shao, associate dean for International Programs in the Belk College of Business, represented UNC Charlotte on the delegation, which traveled Sept. 23 - Oct. 3. A principal focus of the delegation was to explore possibilities for a summer program in China serving students system-wide. Through several meetings with various Chinese institutions in both Shanghai and Beijing, potential sites were identified for this program.

The UNC system hopes to offer the program, which will focus on language and culture, in summer 2006. Shao also met with representatives from the business schools to discuss further possible collaboration on behalf of the Belk College. The College is working with Fudan University's School of Economics in Shanghai to establish a partnership in math finance education. The delegation also explored the possibility of receiving teachers from China to teach Chinese at UNC institutions. These instructors might be able to offer teleconferenced courses in Chinese language and culture to students at institutions that do not currently offer Chinese. UNC Charlotte already offers Chinese language courses, and Shao said they hope to have a visiting faculty member from Fudan teaching a course here within the next 12 months.

In Beijing, delegates met with officials from the Chinese Ministry of Education. These meetings were positive and gave the delegation great insight into working with Chinese universities and the Chinese system of higher education, Sekulich said. ■

International Studies Update

International Studies has settled into its new office space in Macy 103. Garth Green, lecturer in Anthropology and International Studies, has joined Director Harry Chernotsky in the Macy 103 suite. With more than 140 majors currently in the program, International Studies continues to grow at a rapid pace. More than 70 students have graduated with a degree in International Studies since its creation in 2000. This fall, a number of extra-curricular activities and informational programs have been scheduled in conjunction with the International Studies Student Association (ISSA). In cooperation with the University Honors program, plans are underway for the development of a joint three-week summer study abroad program in Ludwigsburg, Germany.

Education Abroad Advising: a Growing Trend

Student advising comprises a large part of the work done in the Office of Education Abroad (OEA). UNC Charlotte students are showing an increasing curiosity about the world around them. Last year, OEA saw a record number of students come through the office for advising, and this year OEA has advised almost 10% more students than the same time last year. The trend is anticipated to continue.

OEA offers 4 advising sessions each week. Students come to a group advising session to learn the basics about study abroad, selecting an appropriate program, and what they need to do to facilitate the process. OEA advisors then work with the students one-on-one to prepare them for both their time abroad and their transition back to the United States and UNC Charlotte.

Intercultural Outreach Programs Completes Successful Summer Schedule

The Intercultural Outreach Programs office finished a productive summer of five separate educational and cultural immersion programs. The programs focused on globalization and engineering design, computer game design and development, American teaching methodologies for primary and secondary education, and English language training. Participants included engineering students from Kyungpook National University and computer science students from Hallym University, both in South Korea, as well as elementary, middle and high school teachers from Japan.

In addition to attending classes and guest lectures focusing on their area of interest, participants also visited local museums, schools and sporting events for an American historical and cultural perspective. More than fifty UNC Charlotte faculty and staff members, eleven UNC Charlotte students, and six community experts contributed to the success of these programs.

Hiroko Arai attended one of the summer programs, "Mini-internship for Japanese Elementary Teachers", for the third year. When asked why she continues to participate, she replied, "I can't help it. I must come. I gain enough energy and ideas to last the school year. I want to come each and every year I can in order to stay revitalized." Susan Lambert, Director of Intercultural Outreach Programs, noted that the return of teachers, such as Hiroko, to the program is the best testament to the success of the programs. ■

Medeiros will be presenting at the F1 Regulations for Beginners workshop, Sekulich will attend as Co-Chair for Local Arrangements for NAFSA Region VII Conference 2006 in Charlotte and as Chair-Elect for the Board of North Carolina Association of International Educators.

ELTI Enrollments Rebound, Aided by Saudi Scholarship Program

After a fairly drastic decline in enrollments following the events of September 11, 2001, the English Language Training Institute (ELTI) is seeing a steady return to its earlier student numbers. Largely caused by visa restrictions and economic factors, universities and colleges throughout the United States lost a significant number of international students after 9-11. Intensive English programs were hardest hit, some closing their doors completely. ELTI, the largest university-based English program in the Carolinas, experienced a 40% drop from enrollments prior to 9-11.

Since Spring 2005, however, students have begun returning to ELTI. Fall 2005 enrollments are at 80% of pre-9-11 numbers. ELTI anticipates that Spring 2006 enrollments will return to earlier ones due to an influx of students from Saudi Arabia. An agreement between the U.S. and Saudi Arabia has allowed the Saudi government to reinstate a scholarship that will send upwards of 7,000 Saudi students to the U.S. in the coming year. ELTI expects 30-35 of these to attend the program in the spring. Most of them will enter UNC Charlotte academic programs after leaving ELTI. Based on a conversation with the Saudi Ministry of Education, ELTI's Director foresees this scholarship program continuing beyond this year, providing an ongoing flow of Saudi students to ELTI and the University. ■

Lecture to Discuss Latin American Communities of African Descent

Judith Morrison, the executive director of the Inter-Agency Consultation on Race in Latin America (IAC) and a senior associate of the Inter-American Dialogue, a leading non-governmental agency for exchange, debate, and policy analysis regarding the Western Hemisphere, will present a lecture on Latin American communities of African descent on November 10 in Room 124 of Atkins Library at 7:30 p.m. The lecture is free and open to the public.



Before taking her position at the Inter-American Dialogue, Ms. Morrison was director of the Brazil program at the Inter-American Foundation. She was responsible for creating Brazil's first private sector eco-development fund. Morrison is the contributing editor of *Economic Development in Latin American Communities of African Descent* (IAF: 2002), and contributing author to *Africana: The Encyclopedia of the African and African-American Experience*. She has taught at the Universidad de Los Andes (Bogotá, Colombia) and the Universidad Nacional de Colombia. She has spoken and published widely in English, Portuguese, and Spanish. Morrison earned a master's degree in income distribution and poverty alleviation from MIT as a Woodrow Wilson Fellow.

Morrison's lecture is sponsored by the Department of Languages and Culture Studies with support from the College of Arts and Sciences, the Office of International Programs, and the Provost as part of a bi-national project supported by the U.S. Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education (FIPSE) and the Brazilian Ministry of Education's Coordenação de Aperfeiçoamento de Pessoal de Nível Superior (CAPES). The focus of the project is "The African Diaspora in Brazil and the United States", and its primary purpose is to create student and faculty exchanges between three U.S. and three Brazilian universities. The two lead institutions in this project are UNC Charlotte and the Federal University of the state of Paraná in Brazil. The other four universities participating are the University of South Carolina at Columbia and Winston-Salem State University, in the U.S., and the federal universities of the states of Bahia and Santa Catarina in Brazil. ■

International Coffee Hour *Working Towards Campus Internationalization*

The International Coffee Hour program is designed to bring international and American students, faculty and staff together for conversation, refreshments, and general interaction so as to provide a sense of community for international students and scholars, as well as to improve steps toward campus internationalization at UNC Charlotte.

The program has been quite successful, averaging approximately 60 attendees at each event, and continues to welcome faculty and staff to stop-by and meet people from around the world in an informal environment.

International Coffee Hour takes place on the first and third Thursday of each month while classes are in session, and runs from 4-6pm in the Faculty/Staff Dining Room of the Prospector Cafeteria.

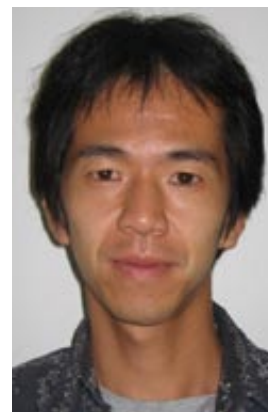

Visiting Japanese Administrator: Norito Hamada

The Office of International Programs (OIP) welcomes Norito Hamada to the Office of Intercultural Outreach Programs (IOP). Mr. Hamada will be interning at OIP, particularly with IOP, as part of the LEAP (Long-term Educational Administration Program) Internship Program from October 17, 2005 to March 17, 2006. LEAP



is a year-long professional development program sponsored by the Japanese Ministry of Education, Sports, Science, and Culture (MEXT) and managed by Montana State University (MSU) Office of International Programs. The key objectives of the program are to aid participants in improving their English, learning about the U.S. higher education system, and interning in an international programs office.

Mr. Hamada joins OIP from the Nara prefecture of Japan where he works at the Nara Institute of Science and Technology. He is participating in the LEAP program in an effort to contribute to the Nara Institute's changing administrative system and international recruiting efforts, both of which are particularly important to the development of the Institute.

Nara Institute is a graduate school with a primarily Japanese national and Asian-based international population. As their funding increasingly relies on international tuitions the need for more specialized administrative positions likewise increases. In the past, Japanese staff has rotated through the various administrative offices on a two-year basis. While this allows for experience in a broad range of fields it can be detrimental to developing relationships with international universities and thereby inhibits the recruiting process.

Mr. Hamada will be working with all the programs under the auspices of the Office of International Programs during the next six months. He will have the opportunity to participate in the organization of the various programs, explore ideas for events with an international focus that may translate well in the Japanese system, practice English, and develop a better understanding of how institutes of higher education are funded in the U.S. When he returns he will be working in the International Affairs division at the Nara Institute to apply his experiences at MSU and UNC Charlotte. ■

Student Profile: Kashif Hamid

Kashif Hamid grew up in Lahore, Pakistan. Lahore is the second largest city and borders India. His decision to study here was largely influenced by his supportive parents and his perception of more extensive research facilities and greater professional resources available in the United States. Hamid arrived in August 2001. Coming from a mostly homogenous country to a country where a person may encounter different ethnic backgrounds and cultural worldviews multiple times a day was initially overwhelming, but Hamid quickly adjusted and began contributing to the UNC Charlotte community.



During his time at UNCC, Hamid has developed the technical skills needed for proficiency in his studies as well as soft skills needed for leadership. He has completed his M.S. degree in Electrical and Computer Engineering at UNCC and is currently working towards his PhD in Optics, a field combining electrical engineering and physics. He has worked as a research assistant on a project sponsored by the U.S. Air Force and in collaboration with several other universities developing a device with multi-layered memory capacity.

In addition to his academic pursuits, Hamid has embraced the American emphasis on student involvement in campus associations as part of the educational experience. Although student clubs and organizations exist in both countries, Hamid has noticed a more supportive structure for such entities in the American system. Financial funds are more available, faculty and staff are active participants, and there is a high level of inter-club organization that encourages student participation in multiple clubs and fosters an environment of cooperation. Therefore, in an effort to promote a positive Pakistani image to the Charlotte community and to provide support for incoming Pakistani students, Hamid founded the Pakistani Student Association (PSA). He has also served as Resident Advisor, President of the International Club, SGA President for the Engineering School, and SGA Senate and Executive member.

Upon graduation, Hamid will continue to practically apply the lessons and experiences he has had at UNC Charlotte. ■
